

I joined the yellow throated warbler because I think they're very cute and the more I learned about it, the more I loved it. I also learned the feathers were hard to draw because of the texture, but overall, I think this bird is a good one to draw.

Today I will be writing about all the information and facts I learned about yellow throated warblers while creating my art piece.

One of the first things I learned was what its appearance looks like. In the summer, male yellow throated warblers have gray wings with white bars. Their throats are yellow, like the name, and the rest of the stomach is white, with black streaked on their flanks. Their heads are also patterned black and white. On the other hand, female yellow throated warblers look like dulled out males with less bright colors.

Another thing I learned was distribution and their habitat. Yellow throated warblers breed in southeastern North America, and their breeding extends from Pennsylvania and Missouri to the Gulf of Mexico. These birds are also migratory, migrating to the Gulf Coast, Central America, and the Caribbean.

Now we are going to finally talk about their diet. These birds usually eat insects, which they pick from leaves or snatch them out of the air. In the winter time, they eat fruit more regularly.

Finally, I will finish off talking about what I learned with breeding. The yellow throated warblers build cup-shaped nests, built of moss. They are also helpful with cedar needles and Spanish moss.
